PRESIDENT REPORT - Presented by Jeff Campbell

Academy Program

- The Board recognized that we needed to do something to increase the level of competition in our Association, and strengthen the development of our players.
- After a couple years of putting the idea on the back burner, the Board was able to a plan of action together with the introduction of the Academy Program, Team Development Program and Power Skating.
- Some programs sold out, and some were about a 75% participation. So, as a first-year program; this was positive.

Central Zone & Referee Participation

- Lost nearly 60% of the Officials pool coming in to COVID.
- It's important to note that when the complaints come in, we don't necessarily get to hear the outcome of the complaints when they are launched. With how overwhelmed they were, we needed to work on a case-by-case basis.
- We plea to coaches that they need to remember that often times the officials on their game have potentially worked 3 or 4 games prior so at times their automatic response was to eject coaches.
- Try to provide more training.
- We have been without a Referee Coordinator for about 3-years now and we need volunteers to make things happen. If you have officiating experience, or know someone please get in touch with us.
- With everything that we do as a Board, sometimes there are matters that need to take a backburner.
 We are volunteers and we do the best that we can.
- If you are here, you took the time to see the positions that are available, please consider joining.



TREASURER REPORT – Wes Jardine

Program Expenses as a % of Registration Fees

Program Expenses as a % of Registration Fees



- Consistent with previous years, community program hockey expenditures were greater than our registration fees. The shortfall was \$60,000.
- The Association relies heavily on AGLC funds, development clinic fees and other administrative fees to supplement our core community hockey programs.
- We utilized \$74,000 in AGLC funds to offset the shortfall. The enhanced Development program generated almost \$27,000 in net revenues.
- In addition, we recorded over \$30,000 in volunteer bonds redeemed.
- Given uncertainty due to the pandemic, the Board chose not to replace any jerseys in the past season (or in the prior year); therefore, our expenses were lower than historic trends.
- As a result of these other revenue sources and no spending on equipment/jerseys and socks, excess revenue over expenses in 2022 was almost \$87,000.
- We are expecting to see an increase in costs in the next season. Ice rental costs, our largest expense, are expected to increase by about 5%, or approximately \$30,000.
- We will see two sets of jerseys replaced for next season. Jersey replacement for U11 & U13 is expected to be about \$75,000.
- We have also redesigned our Volunteer Program which is expected to provide more volunteer support to run the Association, but will also likely result in a meaningful decline in volunteer bonds redeemed.
- You will hear more about the redesigned Volunteer Program tonight as well as throughout the summer.
- Registration Fees. We have not increased registration fees since the 2019/2020 season so fees have remained unchanged in the past three years.
- Due to expected increase in operating costs, namely ice expense, as well as the requirement to replace jerseys and equipment after a two-year hiatus on spending, we will be raising registration fees for the 2022/2023 season.

COACHING REPORT

Pre-Skates and Evaluations

Shout out to the handful of coaches that helped tirelessly with negotiating the beginning of the season.
 Pre-skates, evaluations and placement games required many volunteer coaches. More volunteers with a coaching background are needed during this time to ease the pressure on our evaluation's portfolio.

Team Placement/Season

- There were 214 coaches rostered.
- There were 13 coaches who worked with multiple teams: Jordan Burke, Oswald Chan, Paul Charlebois, Alex Chmilar, Greg Clark, Justin Crockett, Kyle Dodginghorse, Scott Feener, David Kokayko, Mark Livingstone, Vlad Malast, Josh Martin, Devin Mildenberger.
- Shout out to our non-Parent Coaches John Wynne, Marc LeVangie, Dave Martin, and Shawn Renneberg.
- o There were also three (3) Mentors: Randy Bacon, Wayne Clements, and Hugh Lasham.
- There were three (3) open roster spots in the U15, and U18 age categories.

Coach Certifications

- As a result of many new coaches stepping forward to fill roster spots, additional coaching certifications were required for completion.
- A number of certifications were completed this season, which should benefit our coach selections in the upcoming seasons.
- o In conjunction with Hockey Alberta, SW Hockey hosted certification clinics in October. The SW Hockey Development team & Hockey Calgary; hosted multiple coach clinics throughout the season.
- This process went much smoother this season due to our efforts from 2020-21. However, maintaining, and ensuring that all coaching certifications are completed, continues to require consistent monitoring from registration to rostering deadlines.

CUBS Program & Winter Development

- Trying to build the program again from the ground up. Last time the CUBS Program was attempted, there should have been more communications when it was launched and the coaching support wasn't quite where it needed to be. The Board took those points and have re-launched the program.
- Several Coaches helped this season with overseeing the re-introduction of the CUBS Program and the Winter Development Programs.



- Thank you to Tom Durnie for leading the Winter session, Shane Maguire and Tighe Mills for leading and monitoring both sessions. Special thanks to Devin Smith and Karl Schwonik for their on-ice consistency, and the multiple player mentors who assisted on-ice activities.
- Without the help of the non-parent Coach volunteers, the learning experience for these young players would not have been as rich.
- There were approximately 24 players this past season; trying to get the kids in the game early.
- Will continue with the program again this coming season.

Attack Sports & CoachThem Partnerships

- In the past there was \$500 provided to teams to use towards development that they could book on their own. Some teams did this well and others thought they could do better and didn't take advantage of the funds for added development. Therefore, the Association partnered with Attack Sports to provide the development directly to the teams.
- In coordination with the Development Directors a roll out of coaching for our coaches took place during the season. Attack Sports worked with every team in the Association to assist with skill development and coaching development. Season-Planning, Skills Development (Defensive and Offensive), and Practice Planning were all areas of focus for Attack.
- CoachThem allowed coaches to support their practice planning with digital support. Coaches could use
 the App to find relevant drills for their team, draw up plans with ease, and bank them into the database
 found in the program. Constructive feedback has been shared with the development team and this
 feedback will be considered moving forward.
- The Development and Coaching portfolios will continue to work together to address the needs of our coaches regarding these partnerships.

Coach Year End Evaluation

- The annual year end coach survey was conducted and made available to all families on SW Hockey teams. There are a total of 1,168 responses that have been received; over 208 coaches. This led to an average of 6 submissions per coach. Some received more, some less.
- Upon an initial review, the feedback trends are consistent with past seasons. Shane Maguire will be reviewing these over the coming weeks.
- The evaluations are used during the coaching interviews to try and improve the product on the ice; so that we can get more coaches like John Wynne; engaged with our kids.

Director & Assistant Director of Coaches

- Rob Cowan assumed the role of Director Coaches during evaluations, and Shane Maguire assumed the role of the Assistant Director of Coaches shortly after.
- They dove in and have done a great job!

Special Thank you!

- While the coaching portfolio is always busy, these last two seasons proved to be a true test for our directors, as many COVID restrictions broke traditional lines of communications; the portfolio took on much administrative responsibility through online measures (Zoom), and using a combination of email and talk/text. A return to more in-person conferences was a strong sign that the season tried to run with normality whether the issues were positive or negative.
- Christina Bowles, Rob Cowan and Shane Maguire stepped up in an unprecedented way!
- We overcame the challenges, restrictions, limitations at every turn; from coaching certifications, coach/team discipline, and officiating complaints, it was a season to remember.
- Thanks, for their many hours and late nights to ensure we could get our kids on the ice in any way possible.
- It's individuals like this that allow our kids to play the great game we know and love!

ICE REPORT

- Southwest Hockey continued with the OneClickIce Scheduling Software.
- o Teams must continue to keep in mind the numerous factors that are considered during the scheduling process.
 - Aim for teams to have a similar # of: hours, full / shared allocations, total practices, early / late times in addition to the following checks and balances are done:
 - o Minimum 15 hours between ice times.
 - Limit the number of back-to-back days.
 - Dry spells aim for none. Dry spell is only a dry spell if a team has no game OR a practice.
- For the <u>2021-22 season</u>, Hockey Calgary introduced a change to the Timeline of Scheduling:
 - Defined Development Phase (October 1 October 22)
 - Shorter Seeding Round (October 23 November 21)
 - Seasonal Break (November 22 December 5)
 - Longer Regular Season (December 6 to February 20)
 - Winter Break (December 24 January 1)
 - For the <u>2022-23 season</u>, the Season Timeline will run with the same sectioning.
- Tournament Packages were offered this season and were very well received. Current plan is to offer packages again in the upcoming season.
- Southwest will continue ice contracts with: Cardel, Seven Chiefs, Oakridge, and some City facilities.

- *The 2020-21 numbers that were included had the average of <u>BOTH</u> the 'Cohort Season' and the 'Regular Season'; had the 'Regular Season' not been cut short.
- HCAL Column: is the average numbers according to the Community Associations within Hockey Calgary. Not including House League, or the Elite Stream.
- For U7 The range guide provided for practices is between 40 50; but will depend on the number of weeks available and number of games provided as this is somewhat a 'set program' / twice per week.



EVALUATIONS REPORT

- Overall, the evaluations process for the 2021/2022 season was successful.
 - o Over 800 participants were evaluated and placed within a 6-week timeframe.
 - We made it through all of evals and the whole season!

O What worked well?

- Dedicated coaches running the timed drills for all ice sessions. Consistency with all age groups helped these sessions run efficiently.
- Incorporating U13 Elite tryouts and staggering all releases to ensure that released players were fully evaluated within Southwest.
- World Pro evaluating goalies in goalie specific sessions as well as within age group level skates.
- o Completing pathway skates and initial placement skates based on cohort/team grouping from last year.
- Completed minimum of 3 pathways skates for all players for age groups U9 and above.
- Completing timed drills for realignment of groups given challenging COVID times.
- Continued with the "one-score" ranking vs. in the past where evaluators were asked to rank on multiple criteria. Allows evaluators to watch more of the game and less focused on filling in boxes.
- Completing body contact sessions for U15 players during pathway skates.
- Age groups U11 and above got multiple full-ice game for evaluations.

O What can we do better?

- We need volunteers with hockey knowledge in the stands helping. There were times we were struggling to find people and it doesn't take a rocket scientist to know that having three (3) people watching the ice time to know they could miss something. We are continually asking for help and there will be even more communications going forward.
- As part of the coaching application process, coaches will be expected to help during evaluations.
- We want to give our athletes the best chance we can, and we need hockey acumen in those stands.
- Recruit additional volunteers to reduce stress and work-load for Age Group Coordinators; both on-ice and off-ice.
 - Split specific roles into on-ice and off-ice portfolios to ensure consistency between skates as well as within the age groups. Volunteers are key to successful evaluations and we need to recruit more people to support all aspects during evaluations.
- Improve Hybrid Goalie evaluation plan and communication.
 - Was challenged this year by illness and absences.
- o Continue to communicate and listen to member suggestions to help make improvements to the process each season.

Pending for the 2022-2023 season

- The addition of a Goalie Coordinator position to support goaltenders during evaluations with goalie specific expertise as well as throughout the season.
- Utilize half-ice boards for the U9 evaluations to simulate actual game-play
- Reduce the number of 3v3 small area games in U9 and add more skills as well as half-ice 4v4 games.
- Addition of pucks to a handful of timed drills for U9/U11/U13.
- Utilizing U15 and U18 participants as volunteers during pathways skates as a means to alleviate the time ask of coaches.
 - These sessions can be applied to the U15/U18 family's volunteer bond.
 - These roles have been officially added as: 'Junior Coaches'.
 - Want our kids to also have an opportunity to give back and help.



- Pathway Skates
 - Starting August 29th Player Pathway skates will begin for U9, U11 and U13.
 - For U15 & U18 they are tentatively scheduled to begin approximately September 9th.
- Evaluation Schedule
 - While the evaluation schedule is still being finalized, U11 is tentatively scheduled to begin later in the week of September 6th.
 - U9 is tentatively scheduled to begin mid-September.
 - U13, U15 and U18 will continue to be later in the month to accommodate the Elite Tryout releases.
- The evaluation schedule will be posted mid-August, barring anything unforeseen.

o 2021-2022 Volunteer Bond

- Unfortunately, this season had MANY unfulfilled positions, which resulted in some volunteers having to hold multiple roles.
- This season was also had a record high number of volunteer bond cheques that were cashed, totaling: \$30.100!
- As a large association, we are dependent on volunteer help from each and every family to ensure a successful hockey season. The Association needs our members' help!
- Unfortunately, due to these record numbers, significant changes to the volunteer bond for the coming 2022-2023 season have been implemented to try and ensure that the critical time needed during the months of September/October are met.

Key highlights for the 2022-2023 season:

- Volunteer Bond Amounts:
 - Community increasing from \$350 to \$500 and House League increasing from \$200 to \$350
 - Post-dated cheques are no longer required.
- Will be moving to a credit system (by sessions) to track and fulfill volunteer time.
 - Will not be referring to hours.
 - Bond fulfillment will be referred to completed credits (sessions).
 - Four (4) Credits required to be completed for the Community Program.
 - Three (3) Credits required to be completed for the House League Program.
- There is a **Bonus Opportunity** being offered if members volunteer a minimum of 2-credits between August 29th and October 5th.
 - If a member volunteers a minimum of two (2) sessions, their bond will be considered fulfilled and they will not be required to fulfill four (4) credits.
- Coach Applications As part of the coaching application, all coaches will be required to fulfill a minimum of two (2) credits between August 29th and October 5th. Available sessions will be on a "firstcome basis."
- Team Level Involvement: Regardless of Association volunteer bond status, ALL members are required to ensure their team always has volunteer coverage, for all required positions.



- o Bonds that are not completed will have their member account billed through TeamSnap.
- o If bonds are not cleared by March 31st, there will be a **late fee added (\$50)**, and members will be placed as a Member Not in Good Standing; whereby they will not be able to register for the upcoming season until the bond has been dealt with.
- Opting Out will not be permitted until January 15th
 - We want your help, not your money.
- Time Keeping, Score Keeping and Penalty Box roles will NO LONGER count towards a volunteer bond.
 - These roles must be fulfilled as part of the Hockey Calgary Rules & Regulations. No credits will be accepted.

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INTRODUCTION of Incoming Director of Volunteers – Presented by Wes Jardine

o **Cathryn Mailey** was nominated and accepted the nomination in writing. No other nominations were received; therefore, **Cathryn** is elected based on acclimation.



Question & Answer Period

- The 'floor' has opened up to any members who have questions.
- Q: There was a substantial number of surveys that were sent out. Is there anything we've learned?
 - A: Coaching surveys are collected for certain reasons and kept confidential for the coaching group / board. The feedback is reviewed, and if there is one parent who goes off, it's hard to put a lot of stock in that. But if there are numerous concerns then this is easier to action.
 - A: With respect to the surveys around Academy, Power Skating; we have a tendency to believe our own press and want to hear at the grassroots level what they thought. We can see between the age groups how parents rated the instruction to gauge if an instructor needs to be moved from (for example) U13 to U15 because of the way instruction is delivered; that they would be better suited for U15. Being a first year, the Board learned as we went and will use that information for decisions going forward.
- Q: Development question. This was great to implement. What else are we doing to build off that? From U11, Tier 1 / Tier 2 it seemed every player signed up and it was great!
 - A: You touched on the cornerstone. We know people want to spend the extra dollars and if we get enough critical mass, then we can proceed to present a program at a lower cost, along with other benefits of running in-house (such as working around schedules to minimize conflicts). If a member goes to another development company, there's no guarantee that there won't be scheduling conflicts then members are either missing those sessions, or sessions with their SW Hockey team.
 - A: There are some tweaks coming to the programs next season, and will be looking to add consistent developing defence sessions on a bi-weekly basis and looking to partner with Pinnacle Development; barring anything unforeseen. We are looking to run them on Friday nights at Oakridge. Target age groups is U11 to U15. Another program tweak is the Power Skating Program. Feedback received was that 60-minutes was too long. So, this is moving to 45-minute sessions.
- o **Q**: Hiring World Pro for evaluations? What is the cost to the Association?
 - A: World Pro was used to evaluate, and each year we review who the provide will be, and also
 use feedback to determine a decision. This decision is also based on the realization that
 evaluating goalies is not something that coaches can do, so this is why outside resources are
 used
 - A: Regarding cost; it's just under \$10,000.
- Q: Why was goalie registration fees lowered vs. providing a credit at World Pro?
 - A: One feedback piece is goalie families are loyal to the training they choose, so that is one reason why registration was looked at vs. a credit.
 - A: From a development side, the Board is working with World Pro to build out more discounted rates with them to add more enticement to goalie families. Looking at discounted packs of 10 or 20; but we don't have a finalize price point yet.
- O Q: Is Derek Purfield coming back?
 - A: Yes, he is confirmed for the upcoming Prep Camp and for the sessions during the season.
 - When we looked at the ratings; Derek was very well received. So, when the board sees that, we want to build on it.
- Q: Are you looking to automate the evaluation sessions? I could look into that sponsorship if there was harmonized interest.
 - A: Would be happy to sit down with you. (Jeff Campbell).
 - A: Please don't ever assume we don't want to hear ideas. We have open minds and as mentioned we want to change the culture to be more competitive and if the conversation



makes sense and is a fit; then it could be considered. If there can be sponsorship with that, then as a not-for-profit ... that would be good too.

- Q: Regarding the four (4) credit weighting for the Volunteer Bond; why (for example) is the Jersey Parent given the same credit as a Manager and Coach?
 - A: It takes a whole team to do a job, and we know some have different amount of weight to them; but we need to take care of the jerseys (they are a big expense for the association) and we need those positions filled. It used to be a 2-credit position and was per ½ season (Oct-Dec) then (Jan to Mar) ... now it will be a full-season role for the four (4) credits.
 - A: You bring up an interesting point. In this Volunteer Bond 'deep-dive' that the SW Board did; and in talking with other Associations is that the team level for awhile (from Southwest), we focused at the team level; but inadvertently were creating issues at the Association level. So, we kind of had to take a stance knowing we have a lot of great parents and coaches to ensure that the roles at the team level will be figured out and filled. If a parent is not going to step up and do tournaments, then the team suffers and won't get tournaments. The parent group needs to band together. The Board needed to ensure that we have a strong foundation of volunteers at the Association level in order to deliver programs for the benefit of our athletes.
 - A: In life there is always going to be those involved, and will step up regardless.
 - A: Members who step up and only have to put in two (2) credits in those few weeks are doing so at a critical time for the Association.
- Q: On behalf of Managers, family's who did not submit a cash call it seems that Managers don't have enough support from the Association to enforce it. A sort of 'good cop / bad cop' situation would be nice to have. You make sure the Volunteer Bond is covered, but cash calls are also important.
 - A: This was brought to our attention; however, not until late into the season. We believe our Team Managers don't really know that they can come to us and think they can solve the problem on their own. We, as an Association, want them to come to us so that we can help.
 - **A**: There is also more processes that have been brought in for this Fall, with regards to cash calls, and a more defined process.
- **Q**: A lot of people ask why it's permitted to evaluate your own kids' age group, when in many associations it is a standard practice to not do this. Parents should be evaluating other age groups.
 - A: This year we put in countless hours trying to get parents from other age groups and we asked them what age groups they are willing to do and less than 12% of those parents willing to do other age groups filled those spots. We cannot run evaluations with those numbers. Therefore, we were forced to open it up. That's great that even 12% were willing to come, but a week before those evaluations were to happen, we just couldn't keep it closed. We would rather there be six (6) data points, rather than one. Because the Association uses OCI (OneClickIce Evaluation Tool), the Eval team can see all the scores, and there are metrics built in where the 'outliers' are flagged. The numbers are not necessarily eliminated, but because they are flagged they can be looked at in closer detail and monitored. If you are evaluating your own kid, you need to get six (6) other 'guys' to agree and get past the system. But there are those checks and balances built in. Bottom line, we need more people; as that means more data points.
 - A: We've looked at other ways to improve the process, but how can we ask for even more money from families? If there is a process that's not going to cost \$60,000, then maybe it's something that could be looked at.
- Q: Why can't a parent know their child's evaluation score? Every other Association does. How do we know where they are weak, and where to get better?
 - **A:** We aren't able to comment on what other Associations do, as I don't have a purview to those specifics, and surprised that that is done.



- Q: SW is wanting to be more competitive; then in regards to practice ratios from full ice to half ice. Speaking with friends and other teams at Glenlake and Trails West; they seem to get more ice and longer durations. What can we do to get our kids on the ice more?
 - **A**: There are teams over there who are buying extra ice to get what you are referring to. There is a bandwidth on association fees that comes from Hockey Calgary.
 - A: The socio-economic group at Trails West and Glenlake is also different; so, we also need to manage this with fundraisers to make more money in order to keep fees reasonable.
 - A: There really is no more (prime time) ice in Calgary. Parents (teams) have the option to go
 and buy extra ice; but those ice times are more often than not going to be the early mornings,
 early weekday or the late-night ice that will be available.
 - A: With OCI: Teams can trade ½ ice with full ice, if they want to do that. While they may get a full ice slot, they may lose being on the ice twice a week with two (2) (½) ice slots.
 - A: HSL members are also paying double the cost.
 - A: If members want more ice, the Association can raise money to try and find that ice; but
 when participation with the Rafflebox only brings in \$5,300 that's not doing much. We have to
 keep costs reasonable. There is also a number of families in SW that receive FESP. We could
 argue that Glenlake and Trails West don't have this. We need to keep the game so that
 everyone can play.
 - A: This is another reason why the Board started the Academy and Power Skating Programs.
 For those families who are wanting even more time on the ice, they have the option to sign up for extra hours.
